The accompanying operating statement is in respect of the affairs of the Club. The attached Statements of Receipts and Payments show the transactions in respect of the General Charity Fund and the Art Show Account for the year ended 30 June 1999.

The balances of the accounts and investments operated for the General Charity Fund and the Art Show do not form part of the assets of the Club.

Investments are recorded in the accounts are their cost of acquisition.

2. DISCLOSURE OF BOARD MEMBER'S INTEREST

The Treasurer is an Authorised Representative of a Licensed Securities Dealer in which he has a pecuniary interest. In the course of operations of the Rotary Club of Camberwell Inc., the Club utilises the services of the Licensed Securities Dealer to invest monies. Commissions may be payable to the Licensed Securities Dealer by investment managers or borrowers for arranging these investments.

Report Of The New Generations Committee For The Year 2001-2002

This year the New Generations Committee worked towards the programs and projects that were set at the start of the Rotary year.

The committee agreed to pursue the following programs.

- 1. Rotary Youth Leadership Awards. (RYLA)
- 2. Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN)
- 3. Siemens Summer Science School
- 4. National Youth Science Forum (NYSF)
- 5. Post Graduate Diploma In Adolescent Health and Welfare
- 6. Home Instruction Program For Preschool Children (HIPPY)
- 7. Lord Sumers Camp
- 8. Friday Night School
- 9. Boroondara challenge Program

At the start of the year the committee sort a budget allocation of \$18,000 that would be used to support the above programs and activities. The committee's activities are broken into three areas, Youth Programs, Youth Development and Youth Health and Support. The Youth Exchange program was initially rejected by the committee but later in the year placed back on the action list.

RYLA

As in past years the club sponsored two candidates to attend the RYLA program at Somers, Damon Carr and Kerryn Clarke were chosen by this year's committee to attend.

The camp was deemed to have run another very successful program this year with a number of club members travelling down on the Rotary Club of Glenferrie bus to visit and see first hand how the program worked.

RYPEN

Again this year the committee wished to participate in the RYPEN program and approached seven schools seeking candidates for this Youth Development camp. Unfortunately we were unable to attract any participants from any of the schools for either of the two programs that were run.

Siemens Summer Science School

The committee approached five schools with one replying. The club endorsed Louis Dunnell who submitted from Camberwell High School.

National Youth Science Forum

The club again supported this worth while two-week program in sponsoring both Andrew Leach from Xavier and Tam Quinn from MLC.

Andrew and Tam visited the club before and after their two week forum and on the second visit they both addressed the club and spoke of there experiences and the notable people they met and how the experience had change them both.

Next years candidates are currently being interviewed.

Post Grad. Diploma in Adolescent Health and Welfare

The club has for a number of years supported this program at Melbourne University. On the 12th September one of the current participants Richard DePaiva addressed the club. This address provided the members with an insight into how valuable the program is to those that are working with youth within our community. Through out the year the club supported four participants in varying stages of their diploma course.

Home Instruction Program For Preschool Children (HIPPY)

The support of this program was continued on from last year. The club made a \$1000:00 contribution towards the purchase of kits to assist in the Brotherhood of St Lawrence's activities, which are coordinated by Joanne Donne. Joanne addressed the club on the 19th September and was presented with the club donation.

Lord Sumers Camp and Power House

This year the committee agreed to support the program and received an application from Camberwell High School, unfortunately due to a time delay in the school not returning the application by the due date the student could not attend the program. The club made a donation of \$250 towards the maintenance of the Mess Hut at Lord Somers Camp (built in late 1930 for the 1931 camp).

Friday Night School

This program was initiated by last year's committee and received further support from the club this year. After visiting the school this year's committee pledged to support the school by donating \$2,000 for the purchase of books for needy students. The club from an anonymous organisation arranged a further donation of chairs and desks to the value of \$5,000 this was presented to Margaret Gurry at the club meeting on the 10^{th} April. The Friday Night School program was recommended to District 9800 with the enclosed letter.

Dear Loryn,

When you visited The Rotary Club of Camberwell in July you expressed interest in knowing more about Friday Night School. Our club only found out about it last year but immediately recognised it's worth and it's potential.

The school began about six years ago ,under the auspices of The Society of St. Vincent de Paul,to help disadvantaged immigrant children with the day-to-day problems of their schooling.

Most of us take it for granted that parents can usually help with the nightly homework. But what help can a mother or father give if they know little English or are illiterate? This is where Friday Night School, with its unique

"no-nonsense" delivery of help directly to the children who need it so badly, comes in.

The Friday Night School is "one-on-one", each child with its own tutor. Every tutor is an enthusiastic **volunteer** who measures, from week to week, the joyful progress of their pupils. Tutors range from retired teachers to groups of senior students from colleges all around Melbourne who give their Friday nights to helping, usually over many years.

Demand for places is increasing. Currently there are over ninety children attending the school. In needy cases the school also supplies text books, stationery and calculators. Used computers are particularly valuable commodities. The computers remain the property of the school and are lent out to families as required.

Every Friday night during term, the magic begins at 5pm in the school hall on the corner of Albert and Hoddle Streets, East Melbourne. This is a supreme example of volunteerism at its best. We have spoken to students from various colleges who, even with all their other commitments, would not miss their time spent with these children.

It is hoped that one of these schools can be established at each of the high-rise public housing facilities throughout Melbourne. We believe Rotary District 9800 could play a vital role in helping to achieve this objective by promoting the cause, providing hands-on assistance, by the donation of goods and services, by funding resource materials and in any number of other ways. The possibilities would be endless. The rewards immeasureable

Friday Night School certainly fits well with the 2001/2002 Rotary theme of "Mankind is Our Business", and we commend it to you as a project very worthy of District support

Boroondara challenge Program

This project was commissioned by last years committee but was completed in the current year. Initiated by the Rotary Club of North Balwyn our club assisted in providing some of the necessary funds to run the program. Our clubs contribution was \$1,800. Eight young people participated in the Adventure Challenge Experience. The aim of the ACE program was to address the issues and needs of the adolescents who participated. The group shared many common characteristics of behavioural problems, which are evident in our society. The evaluation report forwarded to us from the R.C.Balwyn indicated an improved change in most of the participants. The report is available for any members to view.

Youth Exchange

At the outset of the year the committee examined the possibility of running the Youth Exchange program and hosting an overseas student for twelve months. The committee sort and received from the members sufficient support to proceed with the selecting of a student, Hanna Nilsson who is from Finland and sponsored by the Rotary Club of Nykarleby and district 1380. Hanna's visa and other details are currently being finalised before she arrives in July 2002.

Education Victoria. Vision Impaired

The committee received a request for help from visiting teacher Janie McLeod who is a teacher of Braille, Prep to Year12 in the Melbourne suburbs. The committee agreed to support her request for the funds to purchase the Tack-Tiles Braille System at a cost of \$620.

New Generation Award

One of Rotary's aims is to recognise individual achievement. On the 22nd May the club presented to Mr Richard Douglas de Paiva a certificate of recognition for his work as a volunteer and youth worker, working with young children with depression engaged in self harm and drug abuse. Richard was led to his career of caring through his Christian faith. Also presented was a \$500 play-station 2 game for the afterschool drop in centre for the local adolescent youth.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE COMMITTEE REPORT 2001/2002

The Vocational Service Committee has involved the Club in some interesting and worthwhile activities during the year. At the outset our aim was to identify activities which fell broadly into the areas of:

Vocational at Work, Career Development and Awards.

As the year progressed, we supported several projects with which we have had previous experience and others which will be reported on here for the first time.

School Artists Encouragement Awards

By some measure this is perhaps the raison d'etre for the Vocational Service Committee, given its link to our major fundraising activity. Jim and Ivan undertook the task of contacting the schools in our area, inviting the submission of entries in the 2002 Art Show, and all the ensuing follow-up and liaison. The Awards were once again co-sponsored with Deans Art. An extensive mail-out to schools across Victoria inviting them to attend Students Day at the show was also involved. This is a time consuming undertaking and our thanks go to both Jim and Ivan for their valuable contribution. It is fair to say, however, that response from schools has "plateaued" and that a rethink of current procedures is needed if this important link with our up-and-coming artists is to flourish and go forward.

Operation Live Wire

Our Club once again offered to participate in the Live Wire program, which is designed to assist young Australians between the ages of 18-28 to start up a business. Rotary's involvement is to provide counseling and advice to entrants to properly think through their business idea via the allocation of a qualified mentor drawn from participating Rotary Clubs. David Greenall kindly volunteered his services as a mentor this year. Unfortunately, for the second consecutive year, our candidate decided not to continue in the program. Thanks go to David for his efforts.

Rotarians On Line

Our own Geoff Angus was able to put together a series of basic training programs for club members wishing to either update or further their understanding of the internet. Two afternoon sessions and an evening session were held for the 17 attendees who were well pleased with the training they received from Melinda Knight, the Training Manager at Smarttec. The

greatest interest was for information and helpful tips about e-mail, which would be an obvious starting point for subsequent courses. Thanks go to Geoff for convening this activity.

Awards

During the year we encountered some remarkable individuals whom it was decided The club should recognise for their unstinting work on behalf of the community.

Angela Hassett was awarded a citation for "her outstanding contribution to the welfare of young people through her vocational work with the Centre for Adolescent Health, DOXA Youth Foundation and the Kids Helpline, together with her volunteer work with RYLA, Chronic Illness Peer Support Program, Lord Somers Camp and Power House and Can Teen". The club also contributed \$1000.00 to the Murdoch Childrens Research Institute on Angela's behalf.

Molly Frampton spoke to the Club about Court Network, a volunteer organisation offering free support and information to people going to court. Molly held our attention with many amusing anecdotes and some serious stories about her experiences and the valuable work done by this association. As is so often the case, funding is a critical concern, so we were pleased to make a donation of \$1500.00 to this very deserving cause.

At the time of writing, we are putting the finishing touches to a **Vocational Award** which will recognise the outstanding work of a dedicated professional who performs above and beyond the call of duty. This presentation will be made before the end of June.

Workplace Visits

Only one Workplace Visit was possible this year, but it was "a biggie!". On February 27th. a large contingent of Camberwell Rotarians and their friends took part in a guided tour of Colonial Stadium at Docklands, followed by a 3-course dinner in The Nosh Restaurant overlooking the arena. Several interesting options are on the drawing board for further visits, details of which will be passed on to the incoming committee for consideration.

Shine On Awards

These Awards recognise the outstanding service to the community by people with disabilities, and who, through their efforts are a "shining example" to others. This year we were privileged to put forward two nominations for recognition.

Peter Breen, who made an impact on those of us who were present when he addressed the club earlier in the year, has been blind since birth. He has graduated from Melbourne University and the Conservatorium of Music, and has mastered Adaptive Technology in the course of his work. Peter has the rare gift of perfect pitch and is an accomplished pianist and

vocalist, has made several recordings and is in demand for public speaking engagements and special functions. Peter works for the Christian Blind Mission in a Public Relations role.

The Milparinka Group consists of seven intellectually disabled adults who attend Milparinka Education, Training and Support Services in Parkville. Each Wednesday they attend Foodbank Victoria as volunteers to assist with the valuable work performed there, and most have been doing so for over six years. Because of their experience, they have become somewhat expert at their tasks and are able to give directions to newer volunteers on how things are done.

At the Victorian Awards Presentation in April, Peter received a Certificate of Commendation, and The Milparinka Group were Commended and also awarded a Shine On Trophy.

The Melbourne University Centre For Classics and Archaeology

Associate Professor Antonio Sagona spoke to The Club about the work his department is doing in the highlands of Eastern Turkey. Our committee decided to contribute \$2000.00 to The University's Archaeology Support Fund to help with the funding of this major archaeological training program.

Hospitality Transition to Work Program

This is an innovative hospitality training program which enables Year 12 Secondary students to undergo a week of onthe-job work experience in some of Australia's top hotels, gaining valuable insight into all aspects of the operation of such establishments. Commonwealth funding is no longer targeting this type of venture, so we allocated \$2000.00 to assist four students from both Kingswood College and Canterbury Girls Secondary College attend this years' course.

During the year we made contact with the **45Plus Workforce**, a not for profit organisation set up to improve the job prospects of unemployed and underemployed people over the age of 45 years.

We also established an important connection with **The Beacon Foundation**, a not for profit organisation which has a single issue and focus on job creation for youth. Beacon began in Tasmania and has formed a successful partnership with Rotary in achieving some notable results for young people there. We have registered our interest in finding out more about their programs when they come to Melbourne.

As the Rotary Year draws to a close we still have some unfinished business to finalise in the form of **Apprenticeship Awards**. As we have done over many years, we will recognise and commend outstanding achievements by young people on the threshold of their careers.

At our first meeting we had much general discussion as to what projects we wanted to support and what objectives we wanted to achieve during the year. Following is a concise description of the items we tackled during the year.

Madang Saw Mill:

This project was carried over from last year due to a hold up with matching grants. The matching grants finally came through and the money for the portable saw mill has been sent to Parramatta who is now responsible for implementation. Thankyou to Frank Leigh.

Handicapped Children's Centre Solomon Islands:

In conjunction with the Rotary Club of Prahran we sent several thousand dollars worth of painting and artist materials to the Solomon Islands Red Cross Society Special Development School in Honiara. These gifts will help in the development of disabled children, they were warmly received and we have received several thankyou letters.

Thankyou to Ross Liebman from the Rotary Club of Prahran, Pamela Fitz-Gibbon of Deans Art and Malcolm Munro.

Rotary Club of South Hilo (Sister Club Hawaiian Islands):

The Rotary Club of South Hilo requested that we help them support Friends of the Children's Advocacy Centre of East Hawaii; this is a Judiciary Program, which provides support for abused children. We have donated \$2000.00 to this program. Thankyou to Malcolm Munro.

Sister Club Tradate Italy:

20/20 Foundation:

COMMUNITY SERVICES COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT 2001-2002 June 2002

The Committee adopted the following as its objective for the year:

"In promoting the Rotary International Theme 2001-2002 'Mankind is our Business', provide support and assistance, as is considered appropriate, to those persons less fortunate than ourselves and to the environment, in both our local and wider communities, where we believe our Club's contribution can make a difference."

The Committee met with great enthusiasm towards the above objective on 12 occasions throughout the year. Details of projects adopted and/or undertaken follow:

- Foodbank Victoria Rice Project (\$29,625). This project continued on from a commitment made by the previous year's Committee to provide 3 tonne of rice per month to Foodbank. The Rotary Club of Keilor assisted us with the project contributing a further \$3,000 to it. Foodbank distributes around 25 tonnes of donated food per week through 285 welfare agencies throughout Victoria. This equates to around 40,000 meals and/or food parcels per week to those in need in our community. Rice is considered the single most important food item that Foodbank distributes and it has not been available through donated supplies from the food industry due to the saleability and long shelf life of rice. The Committee has committed funding for the project to the end of July 2002 to allow the incoming Committee an opportunity to determine it's ongoing position with this project.
- Myeloma Victoria (\$10,000) Through the efforts of Expo Hire Pty Ltd and a small Organising
 Committee, \$10,000 was raised on behalf of the Club through the Business of Winning
 Luncheon held in November 2001. Funds raised were donated to Myeloma Victoria to assist it's
 efforts with Myeloma research and in raising the profile and awareness of Myeloma. Our
 particular thanks is recorded for the efforts of the management and staff of Expo Hire and to
 those who supported the event.
- Camcare Phones (\$7,500) This project was committed to by last year's committee and completed this year. It provided a new telephone system to Camcare Camberwell, replacing an antiquated system. Camcare is a non-profit community service provider that provides family support, financial and general counselling and information dissemination to our local community.
- Lynden Nursing Home beds (\$4,840). Two electrically-operated beds were provided to Lynden Nursing Home in Canterbury. The Club has had an association with this establishment over many years.
- Camberwell Salvation Army (\$4,800) Funds were provided for the erection of shade sails over a communal area at the Citadel in Bowen Street Camberwell.
- Rotary Child Guardianship Program (\$3,000) These funds provided counselling for one abused child and his/her family for 1 year. This is a Rotary 9800 endorsed program operated by Australians Against Child Abuse.
- Rotary Liver Cell Bank (\$2,500) A Rotary 9800 endorsed project to establish a liver cell bank
 at the Murdoch Institute at Royal Children's Hospital. Our Club's donation will assist with the
 purchase of a much-needed item of equipment in this important medical development.
- Lord Mayor's Camp (\$2,370) These funds were used for materials and support at a Club hands-on working weekend at the Lord Mayor's Camp at Portsea.

- Australia Rotary Health Research Fund (\$2,000) A donation to further the Club's ongoing support to this recognised Rotary health research program in Australia.
- Toy Project (\$2,000) Our Club has a tradition of providing wooden toys to charitable organisations for distribution to children of needy families at Christmas time. Funding was committed by last year's Committee to purchase 180 wooden toys for Christmas 2001. These were supplemented with a further 27 toys manufactured by Club Honorary Member Ken Stevens. All of the toys were distributed by The Smith Family. Because of the long ordering period required, this Committee has ordered \$700 worth of toys in readiness for Christmas 2002.
- Rotary Bone Marrow Research Centre (\$1,000) This donation was made to assist in funding research into the areas of bone marrow transplantation, leukaemia, cord blood banking, cell therapy, gene therapy, thalassaemia and breast cancer. The centre is located at the Royal Children's Hospital.
- Camberwell Grammar School Foundation (\$1,000) This donation was made in appreciation of the assistance provided by teachers and students from the school over the past 15 years at the annual Camberwell Rotary Art Show.
- Men's Health Seminars (\$540) These public seminars on Men's Health were continued on from previous years and funded jointly by our club, Balwyn and Canterbury Rotary Clubs and Boroondara Council. All seminars were well attended.
- Court Network Volunteers (\$500) The amount was donated to this group that volunteer their time to the Court network to provide assistance in what to do to persons appearing in Court for the first time. The amount was to assist with the group's operating expenses.
- District 9800 Multiple Sclerosis Awareness Committee (\$500) A donation to assist the District Community Health Committee in its MS Awareness Program.
- Berry Street Victoria (\$250) A donation to this long established charity that provides child and family care and support services.
- St Mary's College Drama Group (\$200) A donation to assist this group in the production of a play on mental illness.
- Medic Alert (\$200) A contribution to the annual Rotary MedicAlert Club Supporter Program.
- Collingwood-Fitzroy Inner Wheel (\$190) This donation was provided to assist the group in hosting a luncheon where the proceeds of \$2,300 went to the Rotary Bone Marrow Research Centre
- Sale of Christmas Puddings & Cakes These were successfully marketed by Camcare Camberwell. This returned approximately \$1,000 for Club projects.
- Hands-on projects undertaken included:
 - Assisting Rochester Rotary Club with the construction of a fence at a park in Rochester,
 - Assisting with building works at Camp Getaway in Axedale. This camp is a District project to provide a camp facility for children with special needs;
 - Door-knocked for the Salvation Army Red Shield Appeal (\$1,051 raised);
 - Sold merchandise to support Juvenile Diabetes Research (\$475 raised);
 - Sold Red Rose badges for Cystic Fibrosis (\$320 raised)
 - Promoted the Rotary District 'Give a Squirt' Blood Donation campaign.

The number and diversity of projects listed above has provided support and assistance to a wide cross-section of our local and wider communities. I am confident that the assistance our Club has been able to provide through the range and type of projects listed has made a difference to many, and will continue to make a difference to those benefiting from the outcomes from these projects.

I wish to express my appreciation to the members of the Community Services Committee for their continued interest, support and enthusiasm throughout the year.

The activities of the Art Show Committee embraced two significant events in 2001 - 2002.

Dame Joan Sutherland Luncheon

The official launch of the Dame Joan Sutherland project was held in the Savoy Ballroom at the Grand Hyatt Hotel, 123 Collins Street, Melbourne on 27th July 2001. A formal press conference preceded the event under the direction of our Publicist Gerry Devine. All sections of the media attended. The guest of honour was on a rare visit to Melbourne.

The Luncheon attracted 375 guests including some of Melbourne's 'social celebrities.' Past District Governor Greg Ross acted as Master of Ceremonies while Past Rotary International President Royce Abbey represented the Club and Rotary International. Guests of Honour were: Dame Joan Sutherland, Senator Richard Alston [Federal Minister of the Arts], Richard Stone [Royal Portrait artist] and Moffatt Oxenbould [Opera Australia].

During the luncheon Royce Abbey presented the Dame Joan portrait to Senator Alston who accepted it on the behalf of the 'people of Australia,' hopefully to be hung in the National Gallery, Canberra. The presentation marked Rotary's contribution to the Centenary of Federation celebrations. Moffatt Oxenbould interviewed Dame Joan on her operatic career especially as it related to Melbourne and Australia.

The event was a great success. The Club and Rotary generally received substantial coverage by all sections of the media.

I wish to record my thanks to club members, partners and friends who supported the event.

2002 Art Show

'The Camberwell' was used as the theme to promote this year's show. This phrase is used by artists to describe our show. It reflects the affection and recognition of our show. After many months of planning and preparation the Show subsequently turned out to be the 'best Show ever!'

Artist entries were marginally down on last year 2,970 compared with 3,300. Paintings were received on 12th - 13th April. Freight entries were received over a three-day period. This important phase went relatively smoothly with not too many problems.

The Judging Panel consisted of Paul McDonald Smith [Chair], Jane Clark [Sotherby's Australia] and Peter Smales [artist]. The Travel Grant Panel included John Hunt [artist], Clive Sinclair [artist] assisted by Rotarians Peter Anderson, Malcolm Munro and Dino Consalvo. Both panels concluded their grading processes on Saturday evening [13th April].

Panel selection was once again under the direction of Denise Oppy and her talented group of ladies. Once again the ladies did a magnificent job in presenting a wonderful show. Hanging the exhibition commenced on Sunday [14th] and concluded on Tuesday evening [16th]. The Ballroom was virtually completed on Sunday - the first time ever. Once again the hanging process was made easier and faster with our 'hanging rod' system.

Launch Function

For the second time, the Launch Function took on a 'Cocktail' theme. Guests welcomed an enhanced menu and presentation. Over 400 guests attended on Friday evening [19th]. President Murray Dance welcomed our Guest of Honour, Senator Rod Kemp, Federal Minister for Sport and the Arts. Senator Kemp officially opened the show. Guests were most enthusiastic with the works on display recording a 90% increase [\$142,000] in sales compared with the previous year. This was solid start and set the scene for a great year of sales.

Open to the Public

Saturday 20th April was the first public viewing day. Football legend, Ron Barassi came to look at his portrait by Russian artist Vladimir Sobelev. His visit attracted some media attention. Attendance on the first two days was 'solid' but did not match last year's record. Two new Viewing Areas in the Parkview helped secure many sales throughout the Show.

Theme Days

Monday 21st April was the first 'theme' day for Artists. Exhibiting artists were again given free entry. Over 200 artists attended this day and participated in many 'workshops' and demonstrations. This day has now become a 'not to be missed' day for artists.

Presentation of Awards followed in the evening. Awardees and their relatives enthusiastically supported the night. Complimentary refreshments followed the awards.

Tuesday 22nd April was specifically directed to China and Porcelain painters. The Committee felt that the show should offer encouragement to smaller groups within the artists' fraternity. This initiative may result in more porcelain artists entering next year. Thanks to Pierre Kriegler for acting as co-ordinator.

The final theme day was on Wednesday 23rd April for Secondary Art Students. Attendance was reasonable but was down on the previous year. Pamela Fitizgibbon, Deans Art, again sponsored the day. Numerous workshops and demonstrations were offered. The School's competition attracted five schools in the Boroondara area. Thanks to Kerry Ann Sullivan for co-ordinating this day and Artist's Day.

Demonstrating Artists

This year the demonstration area was moved to the gallery of the Ballroom. This segment of the Show was popular with artists and patrons alike with good attendances at most sessions. Thanks to David Greenall for co-ordinating this attraction.

ANZAC Day

This was a 'bonus' day. Although attendance was good, sales reached \$50,000. Once again many sales were achieved through the use of the two viewing areas.

The Show concluded on Friday 26th April. Overall attendance was 10,000. Painting sales increased by 17.25%. Individual-painting sales increased by 100 to 762.

Publicity

Through Gerry Devine, our Show attracted a wide range of publicity. Once again the Herald-Sun provided space for our advertisements, art-feature articles and general news. The *Australian Artist* magazine also provided strong support. The Committee is also grateful for the support from the commercial TV networks through our Patron, Harold Mitchell.

Sponsorship

Prime Life joined the Show for the first time and sponsored the major Watercolour Award. The Camberwell Traders also supported us for the first time. Both organisations have indicated that they will support the Show next year. Tobin Brothers also joined the sponsorship list. Strong sponsorship support assists us in keeping costs down. The Committee wishes to thank to all sponsors and club members who supported the Show through their businesses.

Fellowship

With each successive Show, fellowship is the 'real' winner. This year was no different. Each person involved with the Show learnt something new from his or her fellow workers. The 'wind up' dinner on Sunday 28th April at 'Chois' Restaurant was well attended and was very successful evening. Thanks to the Fellowship Committee for arranging the function.

Summary

At the time of writing it appears likely that the surplus funds to the Club will be in the vicinity of \$150,000 which is a tremendous result.

In conclusion, the 2002 Show established a number of new records in relation to painting sales; this was achieved through improved marketing and sales techniques. The Committee will further refine selling strategies for the 2003 Show.
