## BAKER'S DELIGHT



**CHIEF SUPER TELLS ALL** Guest Speaker Rod Lambert's blow by blow account of the (*Sgt. Gary*) '**Silk** (*Sen. Constable Rod*) **Miller**' murders was compelling 'viewing' last night. Talk about... '*mystery witnesses, glass in the driveway, getaway cars, flat batteries in listening devices, skid marks, stolen vehicles, undercover cops and forensics.*' It had all the intrigue, twists and turns of a Channel 10 movie. Yet the tragedy of it all was that it was very real and took place in our 'backyard' a few miles down the road in Moorabbin.

But what hit me was the 5-6 year time line between the offence and conviction. Far too long according to Rod. The investigation and police forensics involved piecing every little thing together (including residue glass from the smashed rear window in the suspect's vehicle and glass found at the scene of the murder) was simply breathtaking and reflects well on Victoria Police.

**Rod Lambert** is a retired Commander and spent 43 years in Victoria Police. He was awarded the Australian Police Medal, Victoria Police Service Medal and five Chief Commissioner Commendations. As the presiding Chief Superintendent in charge of the City of Melbourne, Rod was closely involved in the 'Silk Miller' murder from start to finish. As he said, "it will go down in history as a brilliant piece of detective work and is regularly held up as an example to young detectives of what perseverance can achieve." It was a most impressive presentation from an impressive former law enforcement officer. Thank you **Gerry (Lavender)** for recommending Rod and chairing the meeting so well, with a twist of Lavender laugh material along the way.

**Like** most avenues of the Club, the New Generations Service committee will be affected to a certain extent this year by the reduced availability of funds. However, this in itself challenges us to look at alternate ways to continue Club support to worthwhile programs in ways that may not be totally financially based and also by seeking avenues to raise supplementary funds.

The good work done by last year's committee in establishing sausage sizzles to raise funds is being continued by the Club as an on-going fund raising activity, but our Committee is also separately looking at some similar avenues for funding during the year. In some areas we wish to assist, such as Friday Night School, we will seek where possible to provide 'in kind' support rather than a cheque, either by sourcing needed equipment or providing 'hands on' help. (The time of the 'physical' Rotarian is upon us!) Support for other traditional Rotary activities such as Youth Exchange need to be discussed with the Club generally before we decide whether to proceed, as whilst these may not require a great amount of financial commitment, they will depend on the willingness of members of the broader Club membership to provide access to host families. The Committee are also working with other local clubs to assist with support for two candidates we have nominated to the National Youth Science Forum as well as the possibility of establishing a Rotaract Club within a local school.

## ROTARIANS PROVIDE MEDICAL HELP FOR LA GONAVE, HAITI

A team of Rotarians from New York, USA, and the Rotary Club of Port-au-Prince, Haiti, brought much-needed medical treatment to villagers on the island of La Gonave in February, and also installed 18 solar panels to power the remote village's medical clinic and water pump.

The four-day mission, organized by George Solomon, past governor of District 7260 (New York), was funded in part by a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant. The team included Rotarian and volunteer solar engineers, plumbers, nurses, and a physician. "Everybody is bringing their expertise to make this project a success. That's what Rotary is about...putting the right people in the right places," said Solomon during the mission, which was his eighth visit to the impoverished region since 2007. "Accomplishing our goals here brings immediate and long-term aid to people who desperately need it." After Haiti's January 2010 earthquake, La Gonave experienced an

influx of people seeking refuge from the devastation in the capital city of Port-au-Prince. More than 30,000 refugees joined La Gonave's 100,000 residents, straining already limited resources.

Christopher Castro, a solar engineer and member of the Rotary Club of Brentwood, New York, said that in addition to installing solar panels, the mission provided vocational training in the use of renewable energy. "Solar energy is clean, renewable, and free," Castro said. By switching from a diesel fuel generator to solar energy, villagers will be able to save money and help the environment, he added.

Medical mission brings emergency care

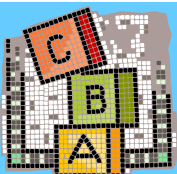


Rotarian Christopher Castor (middle) and Haitian volunteers install solar panels to run a medical clinic and water well for a village on the island of La Gonave, Haiti.

On the first day of the mission, a mother arrived with her 12-year-old son, who was bleeding profusely from his face, hours after the clinic had closed. Nonetheless, two Rotarian nurses and a volunteer doctor treated the boy, but lacking aesthetic and other resources, they were unable to stitch up his severely damaged upper lip. So the doctor, a Haitian American, used superglue packed by a visitor to hold the lip together. The next day, the boy's lip was already mending nicely.

"Can you imagine if we weren't here today? He would have had scarring for life," said District Governor Arnold Quaranta Jr. "This clinic served as many as 70 people a day, most of them here before the clinic opened."

Using its 11 bags of medicine and supplies, the medical team treated high blood pressure, stomach problems, and skin infections, among other ailments. ♦

### 1. Start with Rotary Basics

The colourful Rotary Basics guide (published in the August issue of *The Rotarian* and Rotary regional magazines) gives an overview of what Rotary clubs do. Order copies from [shop.rotary.org](http://shop.rotary.org) for members to share with prospective Rotarians and club guests. Include your club's contact information with the guide or direct prospective members to [www.rotary.org/join](http://www.rotary.org/join), which includes a link to the Prospective Member Form.

### 2. Handle prospective-member inquiries

Club presidents receive inquiries about membership either directly from candidates or via [Prospective Member](#) or [Rotarian Referral](#) forms forwarded from Rotary International. As always, invitations for membership are at the discretion of your club. Consider [creating a brochure](#) or [elevator speech](#) to provide an overview of your club. If you develop a standard welcome e-mail to initiate correspondence with prospective members, include:

Welcome and thank-you to candidate for his/her interest in Rotary

Overview of the club, including a brief outline of Rotary's mission and humanitarian goals, a recent club/district service project, and typical club/district activities

Meeting information, including the name, meeting time, and location

Additional resources, including links to club/district websites or Rotary publications

Follow-up information about the club's next steps in the membership process

### 3. Send prospective member kits

Follow up your welcome letter with the [Prospective Member Information Kit](#) (423), which provides basic information about RI, The Rotary Foundation, and the responsibilities of club membership. Have a club leader contact the prospective member to ensure they've received the kit and to answer any questions about Rotary membership. ♦

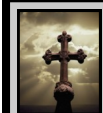
